Course Description:

This class introduces students to the academic study of religion and surveys the global range of religious traditions. It examines various worldwide patterns of religious beliefs and practices, and investigates particular traditions, communities, and their respective histories and development. The course also investigates the role of religion in the modern world.

Course Objectives:

- Students will gain an overview of theory and practices of some of the most prevalent of these traditions.
- You will have opportunities to think about varied conceptions of the ultimate, human nature, the *Self*, and spiritual transformation.
- You will become aware of religions in the news and come to understand some of the historical, cultural, economic and political developments relevant to religions past, present and future.

Student learning outcomes: On completion of this course, students will have

1. demonstrated knowledge of the beliefs, practices, narratives and important persons associated with major religious traditions of the world.
2. expressed themselves on topical issues concerning World Religions.
3. fostered appreciation of global diversity through understanding how religions contribute to and are affected by individual and collective behaviors.
4. gained knowledge of the cultures, languages and social structures of other countries of the world.

The sum of the grades averaged for these four reading check-ups is worth 20% for the final grade for the course. Students may not make-up missed reading check-ups.

2. There will be **three in-class quizzes**, each worth 20% of the final grade. There will be no make-up quizzes.

3. There is a **non-cumulative Final Exam** worth 20% of the final grade for the class.
