Course Description:

This class introduces students to the academic study of religion and surveys the global range of religious traditions. It examines various worldwide patterns of religious beliefs and practices, and investigates particular traditions, communities, and their respective histories and development. The course also investigates the role of religion in the modern world.

Course Objectives:

- Students will gain an overview of theory and practices of some of the most prevalent of these traditions.
- You will have opportunities to think about varied conceptions of the ultimate, human nature, the *Self*, and spiritual transformation.
- You will become aware of religions in the news and come to understand some of the historical, cultural, economic and political developments relevant to religions past, present and future.

Student learning outcomes: On completion of this course, students will have

- 1. demonstrated knowledge of the beliefs, practices, narratives and important persons associated with major religious traditions of the world.
- 2. expressed themselves on topical issues concerning World Religions.
- 3. fostered appreciation of global diversity through understanding how religions contribute to and are affected by individual and collective behaviors.
- 4. gained knowledge of the cultures, languages and social structures of other countries of the world.

Grading:

1. There will be **four reading check-ups**, one on each of the assigned readings. These will be given at the beginning of class on the day the readings are due (see attached calendar). They will consist of three to five short-answer questions about the reading assignments. The sum of the grades averaged for these four reading check-ups is worth 15% of the final grade for the course. <u>Students may not make-up missed</u> reading check-ups.

Note: Buy all of the books for this course as soon as possible and bring the appropriate book to class on the day we are discussing it.

- 2. There will be three in-class tests, each worth 15% of the final grade. There will be no make-up tests.
- 3. There is a **non-cumulative Final Exam** worth 15% of the final grade for the class.
- **4.** In addition to the above requirements for the non-Honors World Religions course, Honors students are required to write a 5-page (approximately 1500-word) **term paper** that further explores an issue covered in class. The topic of this paper must be approved by the instructor by October 31st. The paper is worth 25% of the final grade for the course. It is due by the beginning of class on the last day of classes for the term. This academic-style essay must be double-spaced in 12-point type, in a font such as Times New Roman or Courier New. Chicago or MLA styles are acceptable. The paper must use and properly cite at least two reputable academic sources. The instructor and the CCU Writing Center can help if needed. The paper is due at the beginning of class (12:15 on the last day of classes, Dec. 5, 2017.

Summary of term paper: 5-page research paper

Topic: further explore an issue covered in class

Requirement: use and cite two reputable academic sources

Topic must be approved by October 31

Due date: beginning of class December 5.
