RELG 350: Lives of Hindu and Buddhist Saints

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Office hours: Monday through Thursday 11:30-12:45 or by appointment

Course description: In this course, we will read works about the lives of individuals related to Hinduism and Buddhism, who are alleged to be "saints." These include stories, biographies and autobiographies. We will compare some of the life accounts to similar episodes occurring in canonical epics such as the Hindu *Ramayana* and *Bhagavata Purana*, and Buddhist *Jataka*. We will consider the genre of religious biography in such terms as intended audience and practical usage of the texts. We will have the opportunity to learn stories about ancient and modern Hindu and Buddhist personalities from India, China, Japan, Korea, Southeast Asia and America, and to think of these in terms of history, hagiography and myth.

Student Learning Outcomes:

On completion of this course, students will be able to

- 1. identify major historical figures in the history of Hinduism and Buddhism,
- 2. speak with familiarity on issues in hagiography,
- 3. apply hermeneutic approaches to interpreting writings about religious figures,
- 4. express themselves on issues concerning religious biography as a means of conveying Hindu and Buddhist ideas.

Required Assignments and Grading

- 1. **Quizzes on the readings.** There will be **four short quizzes**, one on each of the first four required texts (not on the Kūkai text). The average of scores on these five quizzes is worth 75% of the final grade for the term. Each quiz will consist of ten short-answer questions.
- 2. Students are required to submit a written evaluation of Kūkai, founder of Japanese Shingon Buddhism: portraits of his life. This must include comments on portions of that writing that are difficult to understand or otherwise in need of elaboration. Comments may also address such issues as believability, internal continuity, and how boring or interesting passages appear. Students are encouraged to make comparisons between portraits of Kūkai's life and lives of other religious or secular personalities. This evaluation may be written in essay form or as margin notes to the text. The evaluation is due at the beginning of the final exam but may be submitted earlier. This evaluation is worth 10% of the final grade for the term
- 3. **Final exam.** There will be a **cumulative** final exam administered during exam week. It will consist of five questions focusing on the course information not included in the five quizzes, e.g., the TM movement, Nichiren, the Dalai Lama, etc. Students are expected to relate this information to the readings. For example, students may be asked to explain how depictions of the life of Nichiren or the Dalai Lama compare and contrasts to those of the Buddha.

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Summary of grading: Average of the four quizzes = 75\%
Evaluation of K\bar{u}kai... = 10\%
Final Exam = 15\%
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Based on this, students will earn a letter grade for the term according to the following system:

Attendance: Following the guidelines posted in the *CCU Student Handbook*, students who are absent for more than 25% of the regularly scheduled class meetings will receive a final grade of "F" for the term. In our course, this means if you miss 10 classes for any reason, you will fail.
